RTB AWARDS CATEGORIES & CRITERIA

Rookie of the Year (Vendor – changes yearly)

Plaque & \$100

Criteria: 1 year or less working in an animal facility. Current membership in RTB AALAS.

Bio-Serv Enhancement or Improvement of Animal Welfare Award (Bio-Serv) Plaque & \$250

Criteria: Member of RTB AALAS. Person nominating must also be a member of RTB AALAS. To recognize contributions of an individual who have contributed a positive impact to enrich, enhance, and/or improve the lives of animals or the environment they work in with regard to animal welfare.

Purina Prolab Award (Purina Mills)

Plaque & \$100 plus \$50 to National AALAS Foundation Education Committee Criteria: Individual must have daily contact with animals and demonstrate positive attitude toward animal welfare, performance excellence, pursuit of knowledge in the field of laboratory animal care, and innovative approaches to husbandry-related problems. Formal education is not considered. Current membership in RTB AALAS.

Research Technician Award (Envigo) Plague & \$250

Criteria: LAT or AALAS-Certified Technologist working with the technical aspects of a research project. Current membership in RTB AALAS.

Technician of the Year Award (RTB AALAS) Plague & \$250

Criteria: LAT or LATG who is involved in RTB AALAS. Current membership in RTB AALAS.

President's Award (Charles River) Plaque & \$500

Criteria: ALAT or LAT, not at a supervisory level, who exemplifies outstanding dedication and service to the field of Laboratory Animal Care. Current membership in RTB AALAS.

Innovation Award (Tecniplast) Plague & \$250

Criteria: Current member of RTB and National AALAS. Demonstration of commitment to innovation and ingenuity in contributions to the field of laboratory animal science. Participation in learning or information programs. Demonstrated participation in developing, improving, implementing, or providing training and education programs. Demonstrated interest in attaining additional education and training preferred. All considerations being equal, candidates having AALAS certifications will be given priority.

Managers Award (Allentown Caging Systems) Plague & \$250

Criteria: LAT or AALAS-certified LATG and/or Registered CMAR working as a manager or supervisor of a Research Animal Facility. Individual must be an active member of RTB AALAS and National AALAS Member.

Clayton Cisar Memorial Award (RTB AALAS Executive Council) Plaque

Criteria: To recognize contributions of an individual to the Research Triangle Branch and to the humane treatment of animals used in biomedical research and teaching. This is not necessarily an annual award, but is awarded based on nomination from the general membership. Selection of the recipient for the award is made by the Executive Council. Individual must be an active member of RTB AALAS.

RTB AALAS Outreach

RTB AALAS attended the 1st annual FFA Day for Heritage High School in Wake Forest, NC on April 12th, 2018. There were around 200 students that circulated the booths during the event to discuss future career opportunities. Several students are interested in pursuing careers with animals, so we were able to discuss the range of prospects within the biomedical research field that are available to them. Additionally, we promoted our focus for improving overall animal welfare by displaying several types of enrichment items for various species. Carolina Tiger Rescue Workgroup Confirmation Information

Thank you for committing to assist Carolina Tiger Rescue! Workgroups play a vital role in helping us accomplish our mission everyday and we are forever grateful for your support.

The following information is important for your upcoming workgroup shift.

Shift Time and Itinerary: Your afternoon shift will begin promptly at 12:30pm and will end at 5:00pm. We ask that all participants arrive on time to allow for filling out paperwork and reviewing safety information and guidelines. Your tour will take place from 12:45pm-1:45pm and will give your group plenty of opportunity to take photos of some of our most compelling resident carnivores. Individuals arriving late will be escorted by a Carolina Tiger team member to meet up with those who arrived on time, but might miss a portion, if not all, of the sanctuary tour depending on the time they arrive.

Age of Volunteers: All members of your group must be at least 16 years of age. Any attendee younger than 18 must bring a copy of our "Minor Volunteer Release" signed by their parent or legal guardian. They can download this release form from the tour page of the Carolina Tiger website at http://carolinatigerrescue.org/wp-content/uploads/Combined-Minor-Release-2016.pdf. Any minor who arrives without this completed form will not be able to participate in the day's activities.

Workgroup Projects: Workgroups commonly assist with projects such as clearing vines and brush from enclosures, building or dismantling fences, digging trenches for drainage, or other light construction tasks. Your exact project will depend on our particular needs at the time, available tools and materials, and progress made by other groups. Because of these variables, we cannot provide exact details in advance about the work you will be doing. All members of your group should be prepared for moderately strenuous physical work in a fairly rustic, natural, outdoor environment.

Proper Attire: The following attire is required when volunteering at Carolina Tiger Rescue.

- Closed-toed shoes or boots only
 - Closed-toed sandals, slip-on shoes, flats, or other similar footwear, do not provide adequate protection from fire ants and other natural hazards
- Long pants no shorts or capris
 - Shorts and capris do not provide adequate protection from poison ivy and other natural hazards
- Short sleeve shirts are acceptable, but please bring a long sleeve shirt as well because we regularly handle poison ivy
- Please do not wear clothing with offensive or inappropriate logos/graphics on them
- Sports bras must be worn with tank tops
- No bare midriffs
- · Please tie up long hair and take off dangling jewelry as animals might be attracted to it

Natural Hazards: Carolina Tiger essentially functions as a 35 acre farm, therefore has all of the natural hazards of rural North Carolina. These natural hazards include, but are not limited to, spiders, snakes, mosquitos, poison ivy, poison oak, fire ants, uneven grounds, and exposed tree roots.

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE): We recommend you bring sunscreen and bug spray for your own personal use while volunteering. Carolina Tiger will provide work gloves and other specialized PPE specific to your job as needed, but each participant is expected to be an advocate for their own safety. Individuals are welcome to bring work gloves from home if they prefer.

Food and Drinks: Bottled water is permitted in the animal sanctuary but other food and drink is not allowed unless it is required for medical purposes.



Inclement Weather Plans: Please consider the weather forecast for the day you will be volunteering and dress appropriately for outdoor work in that weather. Carolina Tiger tours, programming, and site plans move forward rain or shine. The only time that plans are canceled or rescheduled is when thundershowers (thunder and lightning), hurricanes, tornadoes, or ice/snow storms are expected or are actively in the area. Daily activities will remain the same regardless of other weather conditions.

Donations: We ask that each member of your group bring an item from the list below.

- Vine clipper (small, hand-held) **
- Hay fork (long handle)
- Printing paper (8.5x11)
- Gift cards (any value) for Ace Hardware, Home Depot, Lowe's, Performance Auto, or any office supply store
- Cash donations (any amount) are also welcome



Who were/are your mentors?




